### **Education Focus Group Hosts Organ Donation Program**

The Education Focus Group hosted an interesting and informative program on Organ Donation at the 2024 Home and Family Conference. Lindsey Johnson, Manager of Donor Registry and Partnerships at the Indiana Donor Network, shared valuable information about all the possible organs, tissues, and eyes that can be donated, stressing that you are NEVER too old to be a donor. With over 1,000 Hoosiers waiting for life-saving organs, some dying because a donated organ was not available in time, it is important for everyone to consider signing up as an organ and tissue donor.

Ms. Johnson also praised the IEHA membership for their support of the Threads of Compassion program which provides comfort shawls to donor families at the time of their loved one's donation. The shawls offer comfort at a time when there are simply no words to say. Once again, our membership did not disappoint—there were numerous boxes and bags of beautifully knitted and crocheted shawls brought to our conference for Ms. Johnson to take back with her. She shared that they could not have come at a better time, as their supply was dwindling. Keep up the great work everyone!
